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USCIRF “adopts” 35 Chinese prisoners—25 are members of The Church of Almighty God

The U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom delivers a powerful blow to China. This proves just how useful USCIRF is, despite criticism by some US lawmakers.

Bitter Winter (29.11.2019) - <https://bit.ly/2YzfuyK> - Ms. Du Xiaoqin was born on August 28, 1972, in Xialou Town, Lingbi County, Anhui Province, China. She joined The Church of Almighty God (CAG) in 1998. According to a judgment published in the very official data base China Judgments Online, and reported by pro-government Chinese media, on July 16, 2018, twenty-four CAG members were sentenced to jail terms of 3 to 5.5 years by the Yuhui District People's Court of Bengbu City, Anhui Province.

The police had arrested altogether 36 CAG members, including Du Xiaoqin, while they were gathering in Bengbu and shooting CAG gospel videos. After 45 days of secret surveillance, the police had discovered their six gathering places. On August 29, 2016, the Bengbu police conducted a unified arrest of 36 CAG members and confiscated their video-shooting equipment.

Twenty-four of the CAG members arrested, including Du Xiaoqin, were indicted by the Yuhui District People's Procuratorate of Bengbu City on suspicion of organizing and using a xie jiao, i.e. a religious group prohibited under Chinese law. Information on the remaining 12 arrested CAG members is unavailable. On July 26, 2018, Du was sentenced to 3 years and 6 months and fined 8,000 RMB (about 1,200 USD) by the Yuhui District People's Court in Bengbu under Art. 300 of the Chinese law, the provision against the xie jiao. Du and 17 other CAG members still remain in prison.

The CCP obviously believed that Du and the others would simply be forgotten, subject to the harsh life of a remote Chinese jail where mistreatment and torture are common. The CCP, however, was wrong. Not only scholars have studied these cases of application of Art. 300 as gross violations of religious liberty, and evidence that indeed Chinese law punishes the most elementary forms of religious activity by the groups labeled as xie jiao. Now, the U.S. Commission on International Religious Liberty (USCIRF) has

published a list of 35 prisoners of conscience in China, including Falun Gong practitioners and others. 25 out of 35 are members of the CAG, confirming that the CAG is currently the most persecuted religious movement in China.

What is USCIRF? It is an independent and bipartisan commission of the U.S. Federal Government, created in 1998 to monitor the situation of religious liberty outside of the United States. Its yearly international report is regarded as one of the most authoritative assessments of the status of religious freedom internationally. Part of its mandate is to “adopt” selected prisoners of conscience, whose cases it has investigated. Some of those selected by USCIRF are then personally “adopted” by members of the US Senate and House, who start personally advocating for their cases.

Human rights activists and scholars throughout the world have learned to highly respect USCIRF and its documents. It is an official commission of the U.S. Government, yet it is politically independent. Unfortunately, not everybody likes this independence. USCIRF advocates for religious freedom irrespective whether the perpetrators of human rights violations are good economic partners of the U.S. or otherwise. The CCP and other enemies of religious liberty hate USCIRF with a vengeance. And USCIRF bases its work on the idea that religion is a force for good in the world and should not be persecuted.

Interests hostile to religious liberty have now come together in the US, and certain MPs have proposed a law that would dramatically change the scope of USCIRF, submitting the independent Commissioners to government bureaucrats, introducing a political control of their documents, and extending its mandate to crimes allegedly committed not “against” but “by” religions, in discriminating against others (including atheist, women, and homosexuals). Obviously, these problems also exist, but there are plenty of federal agencies in the US dealing with them. The aim of the law is simply to de-potentiate USCIRF, whose good work has disturbed both countries that are important business partners of the U.S. and American companies that work with them. Naming names would be pleonastic. Our readers easily understand which kind of countries do not like USCIRF.

In protest against the new draft law, Ms. Kristina Arriaga de Bucholz, who has been for years a leading and brilliant Commissioner (and Vice-Chairperson) there, has resigned from USCIRF and explained why in a Wall Street Journal article. Followed widespread protest, the controversial draft bill “reforming” USCIRF was withdrawn. But maneuvers against the USCIRF are not over. The precious work USCIRF does about Chinese prisoners of conscience just proves once again that the independence and the role of the Commission should be maintained and preserved—in the interest not of the U.S. only but of all friends of religious liberty and human rights.

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39 Falun Gong practitioners in China sentenced to prison in October 2019 for refusing to renounce their faith

Minghui.org (19.11.2019) - <https://bit.ly/2CTxeeq> - According to information compiled by Minghui.org, the month of October 2019 recorded 39 new cases of Falun Gong practitioners sentenced to prison by the Chinese Communist Party's (CCP) court system.


Falun Gong, also known as Falun Dafa, is a spiritual practice based on the principles of Truthfulness-Compassion-Forbearance. Since the CCP started persecuting the practice in July 1999, many practitioners have been subjected to arrest and detention, imprisonment, torture, forced labor, and even organ harvesting.

The practitioners were sentenced for raising awareness of the persecution of Falun Gong, including telling people about Falun Gong and distributing calendars and brochures with information about Falun Gong.

These sentenced practitioners come from 14 provinces and municipalities in China, with the province of Liaoning registering the most sentences (6). The prison terms ranged from 1 to 11 years, with an average of 3.32 years.

39 Falun Gong Practitioners Sentenced in October 2019



Some of the practitioners sentenced in October 2019 have been repeatedly persecuted for their faith over the past 20 years. Some of their elderly parents or other family members were also implicated.

Due to the CCP's information blockade, the number of Falun Gong practitioners who were sentenced cannot always be reported in a timely manner, nor is all the information readily available.

Among the 39 cases, 11 practitioners had money extorted from them by the police or were fined by the court for a total of 68,000 yuan, with an average of 6,182 yuan per person.

Six of the practitioners are aged 65 or older. Their sentence terms ranged from 1.5 to 7 years, with Mr. Peng Songwei, 71, sentenced to 7 years.

The following is a snapshot of some of the sentenced practitioners.

Dentist Disabled Due to Beatings, Sentenced to 11 Years in Prison

Mr. Li Yongquan, a dentist in Tianjin, was sentenced to 11 years in prison around October 2019.

Mr. Li was arrested at work on December 28, 2017. He was beaten after being taken to Shangmatai Police Station and became disabled as a result.

Siblings Sentenced to Prison Six Months Apart for Their Faith in Falun Gong

Mr. Yuan Bin, 52, of Chengdu City, Sichuan Province, was sentenced to four years and fined 10,000 yuan by Longquanyi Court on October 15, 2019.

Mr. Yuan was arrested on January 24, 2019, for seeking the release of his sister, Ms. Yuan Xuefen, who was arrested on May 21, 2018, for removing propaganda posters attacking Falun Gong.

The siblings' arrests traumatized their parents, who both fell unconscious and were hospitalized. Although their mother was resuscitated, their father passed away from complications.

Ms. Yuan was sentenced to two years on April 28, 2019.

Prior to his latest sentencing, Mr. Yuan has been repeatedly arrested and incarcerated for not giving up his faith. He served one year in a forced labor camp and eight years in prison. He lost his job as a teacher. His wife also divorced him.

Years of imprisonment and torture have taken a toll on Mr. Yuan's health. His hair turned gray, his teeth have fallen out, and his vision has become blurred. He has frequent pain in many of his joints and is unable to lift his right arm due to a frozen shoulder.

Another practitioner, Ms. Ding Shuqing, who was arrested on October 25, 2018, after being reported for using banknotes with printed information about Falun Gong, appeared in court with Mr. Yuan. She was sentenced to three years in prison and fined 10,000 yuan.

Former Prison Guard Given Second Prison Term for His Faith in Falun Gong

Mr. Dai Qihong, a former prison guard in Mudanjiang City, Heilongjiang Province, was sentenced to five years in prison around October 2019. He is serving time at Mudanjiang Prison.

Mr. Dai went missing during a police sweep of Falun Gong practitioners on June 25, 2019. It was confirmed in July that he had been arrested and detained in the Mudanjiang City No.1 Detention Center.

The local court said his latest arrest was triggered by an earlier arrest in 2017.

Mr. Dai was arrested on August 31, 2017, for seeking the release of a detained practitioner. The police confiscated 18,000 yuan cash from him. He went on a hunger strike to protest the arbitrary detention and was twice hospitalized. He was released on bail on March 6, 2018.

On April 8, 2018, the police ordered him to go to the local police station but he refused to go.

They then told him to go to the Aimin District Procuratorate so that the prosecutor would return the confiscated cash to him.

Mr. Dai went to the procuratorate on April 9, only to be taken to the police station and then to the Aimin District Court. The judge sentenced him to an unknown length of time and ordered the police to take him to prison.

Both the prison and detention center refused to accept him after he failed the physical examination. He was released on bail again, before being re-arrested and admitted to the prison one year later.

Prior to his latest prison term, Mr. Dai, a former guard at Mudanjiang Prison, was arrested on March 20, 2008, and sentenced to five years. He endured savage beatings, force-feedings, and being hung up by the wrists and shocked with electric batons. The guards also deprived him of sleep and forced him to sit on a small stool for long hours. He had injuries all over and was emaciated.

His wife divorced him and he was fired from his job while he was incarcerated. He was destitute after his release.

76-Year-Old Woman Sentenced to 3.5 Years in Prison

Ms. Li Gang, 76, of Dalian City, Liaoning Province, was sent to Liaoning Women's Prison on October 22, 2019, after being sentenced to 3.5 years in prison for her faith in Falun Gong.

Ms. Li was arrested on March 22, 2018. She was first sentenced to seven years in prison. When she appealed to the Dalian City Intermediate Court, the judge at the appeals court sent her case back to the lower court for a retrial. The judge at the lower court later reduced her sentence by half.

Anhui Man Secretly Sentenced to Four Years in Prison

Mr. Nie Pengge, 51, a native of Huainan City, Anhui Province, was arrested in April 2019 when working in Zhejiang Province. He was taken back to Huainan and detained at Huainan City Detention Center.

His family was informed by the authorities to visit him on October 30, 2019. Only then did they learn that Mr. Nie has been secretly sentenced to four years in prison without a court hearing. He has been taken to Suzhou Prison.

Heilongjiang Woman Sentenced to Four Years in Prison for Practicing Falun Gong

Ms. Feng Junqing of Hegang City, Heilongjiang Province, was recently sentenced to four years in prison and fined 4,000 yuan for practicing Falun Gong. She has appealed her verdict with the Hegang City Intermediate Court.

It remains to be investigated when Ms. Feng was tried and when the judge announced the verdict.

Ms. Feng and her husband, Mr. Peng Yanfeng, were arrested at home on February 14, 2019. The police restrained Ms. Feng in an interrogation chair and Mr. Peng in a metal cage with his hands cuffed overnight.

The couple was held in custody for 42 days and released only after the police extorted 20,000 yuan from their family.

Ms. Feng was later indicted by the Xing'an District Procuratorate and taken back into custody. She has been held in the Hegang City Detention Center ever since. The timing of her second arrest remains to be investigated.

Another practitioner Ms. Li Chunhui, 44, was arrested on April 25, 2019, when she went with Mr. Peng to request Ms. Feng's release and urge the police not to participate in the persecution of Falun Gong.

Mr. Peng was released 15 days later, but Ms. Li remained in the Hegang City Detention Center. The guards there claimed that Ms. Li was a key coordinator in the Falun Gong group and denied her father's requests to visit her three times. The father is not only concerned about his daughter's wellbeing but also worries about how her two boys, ages 12 and 9, are going to cope with their mother's imprisonment.

It was reported that Ms. Li has also been sentenced to four years in prison and has appealed the verdict. However, the date that Ms. Li's verdict was announced remained unknown at the time of writing.

Two Jilin Women Sentenced to Prison for Their Faith, Family Threatened by Police

Two residents of Liaoyuan City, Jilin Province were sentenced to prison on October 17, 2019, for talking to people about Falun Gong.

Ms. Zhang Shufen was given 1.5 years and Ms. Sun Shiduo 1 year by Longshan District Court.

The two women were arrested on June 5, 2019. The police confiscated their Falun Gong books and other belongings. Both have been held at Xiangyang Detention Center since. Ms. Sun's brother-in-law, who happened to be at her home during the police raid, was slapped in the face by one officer and held at the police station for more than an hour. The police also threatened to force Ms. Sun's son, a college student, out of school, if she didn't give up her faith.

Ms. Sun is an only child. Her father just passed away last year, and her sentencing dealt another blow to her mother, who recently became ill and struggles to care for herself.

Liaoning Woman Given One Year for Putting Up a Banner about Falun Gong

Ms. Huang Keqin, a 55-year-old resident of Fushun City, Liaoning Province, was sentenced to one year in prison and fined 4,000 yuan for hanging up a banner that said, "Falun Dafa is good."

Ms. Huang was arrested on April 25, 2019, and indicted by the Dongzhou Procuratorate on August 9.

Her family went to the local police station and procuratorate to seek justice for her but to no avail.

Ms. Huang was tried by Dongzhou District Court in a makeshift courtroom at Nangou Detention Center on September 4, 2019. Her lawyer entered a not guilty plea for her. She also testified in her own defense.

Woman, 63, Sentenced to 7 Years in Prison

Ms. Zheng Quanhua's family was informed by Jimo Court in late October 2019 that she was sentenced to seven years in prison.

Ms. Zheng, 63, of Qingdao City, Shandong Province, was arrested on July 17, 2018. She has since been held in the Pudong Detention Center and denied family visits.

Within three days following Ms. Zheng's arrest, the police also arrested her husband Mr. Yu Haibo and daughter-in-law Ms. Liang Yanni and detained them for a month.

The Jimo Court informed Ms. Zheng's family that she was scheduled to appear in late July 2019 but did not specify the location of the hearing. Ms. Zheng's family went to the court on the morning of the hearing, only to be told that the hearing would take place in the detention center. When they rushed to the detention center, the hearing was already over.

Ms. Zheng's grandson was so traumatized by the arrests of his grandmother and mother that he became mute.

Mr. Yu recently suffered a stroke because of the repeated arrests and harassment he has had to face in the past 20 years. He remains hospitalized at the time of writing.

Single Mother of Ten-Year-Old Boy Sentenced to Three Years for Her Faith

A single mother in Qingdao City, Shandong Province, was sentenced to a three-year prison term for talking to people about Falun Gong.

Ms. Sui Ying's ten-year-old son was deeply traumatized by her imprisonment and struggled to cope.

Ms. Sui, 44, was arrested on April 10, 2018. She was held at the Pudong Detention Center for four days and released on bail on April 14.

The Huangdao District Court issued a summons on May 29, 2019, ordering her to go to the courthouse to sign a document about her case. After she refused to show up, the judge ordered the police to take her back into custody at the Pudong Detention Center.

The Minghui website recently confirmed that she was sentenced to a three-year prison term. The timing of her sentencing is still being investigated.

This is not the first time that Ms. Sui was arrested.

On October 1, 2000, Ms. Sui was arrested and detained for a month in the Dashan Detention Center when she went to Beijing to appeal for Falun Gong. She was tortured and forced to do unpaid labor.

She returned to Beijing in 2000 and was arrested for doing the Falun Gong exercises at Tiananmen Square. She was later sentenced to two years in the Shandong Province No. 2 Women's Prison.

The authorities transferred her to a local brainwashing center for further persecution at the end of her term and demanded that her parents pay for her living expenses and tuition there.

Two Shanxi Residents Sentenced to Prison for Distributing Materials

Ms. Jia Baoling, 53, and Ms. Yang Erbian, 62, both retired from a chemical plant in Yangquan City, Shanxi Province, were arrested on March 12, 2019, for distributing informational materials about Falun Gong. The police confiscated their Falun Gong books and many other personal belongings before taking them to Yangquan City Detention Center.

Ms. Jia's father-in-law was in tremendous mental distress following her arrest. He lost his appetite and his health quickly deteriorated. He passed away soon after, at the age of 86.

It was recently confirmed by Minghui.org that Ms. Jia has been sentenced to 2.5 years and Ms. Yang to 1.5 years by Pingding County Court.

60 Falun Gong practitioners in China sentenced to prison in August 2019 for refusing to renounce their Faith

Minghui.org (07.10.2019) - <https://bit.ly/35jDp8H> - According to information compiled by Minghui.org, the month of August 2019 recorded 60 new cases of Falun Gong practitioners sentenced to prison by the Chinese Communist Party's (CCP) court system.

Falun Gong, also known as Falun Dafa, is a spiritual practice based on the principles of Truthfulness, Compassion, and Forbearance. Since the CCP started persecuting the practice in July 1999, many practitioners have been subjected to arrest and detention, imprisonment, torture, forced labor, and even organ harvesting.


The practitioners were sentenced for raising awareness about the persecution of Falun Gong, including telling people about the practice, distributing calendars and brochures with information about Falun Gong, and disseminating information about the persecution using wifi hotspots.

These sentenced practitioners come from 18 provinces and municipalities in China, with the provinces of Jilin and Heilongjiang topping the list with 12 cases each. The prison terms ranged from 1 to 11 years, with an average of 3.36 years.

Due to the CCP's information blockade, the number of Falun Gong practitioners who were sentenced cannot always be reported in a timely manner, nor is all the information readily available.


60 Falun Gong Practitioners Sentenced in August 2019

The police extorted money from, or the court fined, 24 practitioners for a total of 239,000 yuan, with an average of 11,381 yuan per person.

Eleven of the practitioners are 65 or older. Their sentences ranged from one to nine years, with Ms. Ma Yunhua, 70, sentenced to 9 years and fined 20,000 yuan.

The following are snapshots of several of the practitioners who were sentenced.

Jilin Man Sentenced to 11 Years, Two Weeks Following His Arrest for Practicing Falun Gong

A local court in Fuyu City, Jilin Province, secretly sentenced Falun Gong practitioner Mr. Liu Qing to an 11-year prison term for his faith in Falun Gong, without informing his family. His wife learned of his sentence later, from an insider.

Mr. Liu's sentence came two weeks after he was arrested at his rental place in Songyuan City, Jilin Province, on August 15, 2019. The arrest came four years after he was forced to move to avoid persecution following an earlier arrest on July 16, 2015.

Because Mr. Liu developed serious health problems after 11 days of detention in July 2015 and was frequently harassed after being released on bail, he decided to live away from home to avoid the police.

The police reopened his case a few days after his latest arrest. He appeared in the Fuyu Court on August 27, 2019.

Without enough time to hire a lawyer, Mr. Liu defended himself and argued that he had not violated any laws by practicing Falun Gong and upholding his faith.

According to his wife who attended the hearing, Mr. Liu was emaciated. He had a bandage on his head and a feeding tube in his nose.

She initially thought that he was holding a hunger strike to protest the persecution and was being force-fed. But when she was asked to come to Fuyu Detention Center to urge him to eat on August 29, she learned from Mr. Liu that he wasn't holding a hunger strike but had been vomiting everything he ate.

Hebei Couple Sentenced to Prison for Distributing Calendars about Their Shared Faith

A couple from Qinhuangdao City, Hebei Province, was sentenced to prison on August 27, 2019, for handing out calendars with information about Falun Gong.

Mr. Li Yanchun, 66, a retired hospital president, was sentenced to 7.5 years with a 20,000-yuan fine. His wife, Ms. Pei Yuxian, also 66, an award-winning oncologist, received four years and a 5,000-yuan fine. The couple said they will appeal the verdict. The two were arrested on November 25, 2018, after being reported for handing out calendars with information about Falun Gong. The police interrogated them for over six hours.

The officers later took the couple to their home and ransacked their residence. When Mr. Li resisted, the officers slapped him in the face, causing his mouth to bleed, and forced him to kneel down with his hands cuffed behind his back.

Mr. Li was released on bail due to high blood pressure after 20 hours of detention, but Ms. Pei was taken to the Qinhuangdao City Detention Center.

They appeared in the Changli County Court on May 31, 2019. Their Falun Gong books, computer, printer, and cellphone were used as "evidence" against them.

The couple's lawyer argued that his clients' possession of Falun Gong books broke no law, according to a notice issued in 2011 by the Chinese Publication Bureau that [revoked the ban on Falun Gong books](#). When the lawyer mentioned the notice for a second time, the presiding judge threatened to remove him from the courtroom should he talk about the notice again.

Two Anhui Women Sentenced to Prison for Their Faith

Two women from Hefei City, Anhui Province, were sentenced to prison on August 9, 2019, for distributing informational materials about Falun Gong.

Ms. Ding Shumei was sentenced to eight years in prison and fined 50,000 yuan and Ms. Huang Liping was sentenced to five years and fined 30,000 yuan. Both have appealed the verdicts.

The women were arrested in a residential area on October 30, 2017. It was reported that the police had been monitoring the women for months and waited for the two to go out together to arrest them.

The Gaoxin District Procuratorate indicted them on August 6, 2018, and submitted their cases to the Gaoxin District Court, which held two hearings, on November 9, 2018 and May 31, 2019, via teleconferencing.

The practitioners' lawyers pled not guilty on their behalf and the women also testified in their own defense. The judge frequently interrupted them.

The judge convicted them two months later on the grounds that Ms. Ding handed out more than 1,400 copies of Falun Gong materials and Ms. Huang distributed over 700 copies.

This is the second time that both women have been sentenced for their faith.

Ms. Ding was previously sent to a forced labor camp for a year and given a five-year prison term in 2011 by the same court. She was also fired from her job with China Electronics Technology Group Corporation No. 38 Institute.

Ms. Huang was sentenced to eight years by the Luoyang District Court in 2006.

70-year-old Woman Given Another Nine Years for Her Faith after Eight Years of Incarceration

Ms. Ma Yunhua, 70, of Xi'an City, Shaanxi Province, was sentenced to nine years and fined 20,000 yuan on August 22, 2019, for talking to people about Falun Gong. The sentence came nine months after Ms. Ma appeared in the Lianhu District Court on November 1, 2018. She has appealed her sentence.

This was not Ms. Ma's first arrest. She was sent to a forced labor camp for a year in March 2000 and her company was pressured by the authorities to fire her.

When Ms. Ma was sent to a forced labor camp again in April 2001, this time for three years, she managed to escape but was captured again months later and sentenced to seven years in Shaanxi Province Women's Prison, where she was savagely beaten, water-boarded, hung up, and not allowed to use the restroom.

Ms. Ma was severely injured and traumatized by the time she was released in 2008, but she was arrested three more times—in 2010, 2012, and 2013. She was held in brainwashing centers for months each time.

Because the authorities stopped her pension during her imprisonment, Ms. Ma went to the local police station to seek compensation in April 2014, only to be arrested again.

She escaped from a hospital during a health checkup that was required for further detention and was then put on a nationwide wanted list as a fugitive.

After her latest arrest on February 6, 2018, the police reopened Ms. Ma's case and vowed to give her a long prison term.

Her older sister, who is deaf and in her 80s, frequented different agencies to seek her release, only to be threatened by the police.

73-Year-Old Sentenced to Prison in Illegal Trial

Ms. Wang Jianhua, 73, from the Nangan District, Jilin Province, was arrested by officers from the Nanlingjie Police Station in the Nangan District around 8 p.m. on April 14, 2018. She was taken to the Changchun City No. 4 Detention Center at 1 a.m. on April 16.

She first appeared in court on May 10, 2019, and then on August 9, 2019. The combined time of the two court hearings was 15 minutes. Ms. Wang was given a four-year prison term and fined 10,000 yuan at the end of her second hearing.

Three Family Members Sentenced to Prison for Practicing Falun Gong

Three family members in Maoming City, Guangdong Province, were sentenced to prison by the Maonan District Court on August 13, 2019, for their faith in Falun Gong.

Ms. Lin Lizen and her son Mr. Wu Chaoqi were each sentenced to five years with a 10,000 yuan fine. Her younger sister, Ms. Lin Yanmei, was sentenced to 4.5 years in prison and fined 8,000 yuan.

The practitioners' lawyers complained to the judge about the heavy terms. The judge implied that he only announced the verdicts that had been predetermined by the 610 Office and he didn't have any say on it. "Feel free to appeal it if you don't agree," he told the lawyers.

The 610 Office is an extralegal agency tasked with eradicating Falun Gong and given power to override the judicial system.

Ms. Lin Yanmei's son, Wang Ruixin, applied to attend their trial in the makeshift courtroom inside the Maoming No.1 Detention Center, but he was turned down.

The Lin sisters' 86-year-old father, Mr. Lin Tong, was depressed to learn that his daughters had been sentenced. "Why do they persecute good people like this? I will go to the city government to appeal for them," he said.

While arresting the three family members in late August 2018, Chen Changxing (director of the 610 Office) and Lu Shanghui (director of the Domestic Security Division) said, "We've finally arrested you all. Now we can get a bonus."

Arrested While Visiting a Relative, Jiangxi Man Secretly Sentenced to Three Years in Prison

Mr. Geng Decheng of Yingtan City, Jiangxi Province, was recently sentenced to three years in prison for his faith in Falun Gong. He was arrested on February 27, 2019, when he travelled 70 miles to Jinxi County in Fuzhou City to visit a relative.

Mr. Geng's wife learned of his sentencing four days later after she went to inquire about his case on August 7, 2019.

Fu Shuhua, the head of Jinxi County Domestic Security Office in Jiangxi Province, said that Mr. Geng was sentenced by the Linchuan Intermediate Court in Fuzhou City, Jiangxi Province.

When Mr. Geng's wife demanded to know why she wasn't informed of the hearing, Fu claimed that she had attempted to call her, but no one answered the phone.

Mr. Geng's wife next went to the Jinxi County Detention Center to deliver clothes to her husband. The guards denied having any knowledge of his sentencing. Only one security person said he overheard people talking about Mr. Geng's prison term.

Mr. Geng's wife didn't stay at the detention center for too long, because she had to rush home to take care of their daughter, Weiwei, who had suffered a mental breakdown after witnessing repeated home-ransackings, arrests, and the detention of her parents for their faith in Falun Gong when she was still a little girl.

When the police ransacked Mr. Geng's home on February 28, 2019, following his latest arrest, they even confiscated his daughter's flash drive with her favorite music. She was so terrified that her face turned pale and she began to mumble nonsense to herself.

Four Practitioners in Jilin Province Sentenced to Prison

Three practitioners from Yushu City, Jilin Province were sentenced by the Dehui City Court on August 13, 2019.

Mr. Liu Fengbao, in his 60s, was given three-and-a-half-years in prison and fined.

Ms. Ding Lijie, in her 40s, was sentenced to four-and-a-half years and fined.

Ms. Yang Yanjie, 52, was sentenced to two years with two years' probation and fined 10,000 yuan.

Mr. Liu, Ms. Ding, and Ms. Yang were followed and arrested by officers from the Zhengyang Police Station when they were hanging banners that said "Falun Dafa is good!" on January 7, 2019.

The homes of Ms. Ding and Ms. Yang were ransacked. Mr. Liu's electric car was impounded and his Falun Gong materials were confiscated. The three practitioners were detained for 15 days before being transferred to a detention center four or five days later. They were officially placed under arrest by the Procuratorate on January 29, 2019.

A fourth practitioner, Ms. Guo Yuzhen, 72, from Wukeshu Town, Yushu City, was given a three-year prison term and fined by the Dehui City Court on August 5, 2019.

Ms. Guo was arrested by Wukeshu Town Police Station officers when she was distributing calendars with information about Falun Gong on December 31, 2018. She was detained for 15 days. She was then transferred to the Yushu City Detention Center on January 14, 2019. She was officially placed under arrest by the Procuratorate about two weeks later.

The four practitioners were tried in the Dehui City Court on April 29, 2019. Mr. Liu Fengbao said in court, "Practicing Falun Gong brings a person health and fitness. If everyone practiced Falun Gong, they would be healthy." A lawyer was assigned to Ms. Guo by the court, but she declined to accept him.

Mr. Liu has previously been arrested six times for his faith. He was twice sent to the Chaoyanggou Forced Labor Camp in Changchun City, where he was mentally and physically abused.

Mother of Canadian Resident Sentenced to Four Years for Speaking Up for Her Faith

An award-winning teacher in Beijing and mother of a Canadian resident was sentenced to a four-year prison term for distributing calendars with information about Falun Gong a week after she appeared in the Shijingshan District Court on August 16, 2019. She is currently detained in Beijing Women's Prison and her family is preparing to file an appeal for her.

Ms. Chen Yan, 51, a chemistry teacher at Beijing No. 9 Middle School, was arrested on December 3, 2018. Her case has received widespread attention in and outside of China.

After hearing about Ms. Chen's arrest, many of her former students called the Shijingshan District Procuratorate and demanded her release.

On the other side of the globe, her daughter, Karen, who currently resides in Montreal, Canada, took to the streets to call for more international support to secure her mother's release.

At the same time, Amnesty International initiated a campaign to rescue Ms. Chen. They urged people to contact Wang Chunfeng, the prosecutor in charge of Ms. Chen's case, and Cui Tiankai, the Chinese Ambassador to the United States.

Many Canadians who've heard about her case wrote letters to the prosecutor and some posted information about Ms. Chen's case on social media.

In response to the global rescue efforts, the prosecutor said that they would release her if she wrote a statement to renounce Falun Gong. Ms. Chen refused to betray her faith.

Having Served 12 Years, Shandong Man Gets Three More Years for His Faith

A Linyi City, Shandong Province, man was recently sentenced to three years for practicing Falun Gong.

Mr. Gong Maohai's latest sentence came only five years after he served 12 years in prison, also for his faith.

When Mr. Gong was released two years ahead of his previous 14-year term in 2014, his hair had turned gray, his teeth were loose, and he suffered from hearing loss as a result of lengthy physical and mental abuse.

With no place to stay, as his wife had abandoned him and his daughter had gotten married, Mr. Gong did odd jobs to make a living in Linyi City. The police still monitored his phone and tracked his daily activities.

Mr. Gong was arrested again while visiting a practitioner on September 29, 2018. He was tried in the Lanshan District Court on July 11, 2019. His lawyer entered a not guilty plea for him.

Yunnan Woman, 69, Sentenced to 3.5 Years for Her Faith

A woman from Kunming City, Yunnan Province, was sentenced to 3.5 years in prison and fined 5,000-yuan on August 30, 2019, for not renouncing her faith in Falun Gong.

Ms. Li Zhuxiu, 69, was arrested on February 27, 2019. The police never informed her family of her situation, and it took them months to find out on their own that she had been taken to the Kunming City No.1 Detention Center following her arrest.

Ms. Li appeared in the Yiliang County Court on July 30, 2019. According to her family who attended the hearing, she looked exhausted and a bailiff had to help her into the courtroom.

Her lawyer entered a not guilty plea on her behalf.

Given her condition, Ms. Li's lawyer requested twice to have her handcuffs and shackles removed, but the judge refused.

Prosecutor Li Haibo accused Ms. Li of "undermining law enforcement with a cult organization," the typical pretext used to frame and imprison Falun Gong practitioners.

Her lawyer argued that no law criminalizes Falun Gong in China and that the prosecutor failed to specify what law's enforcement was undermined by his client and how. The lawyer also challenged the prosecutor for attempting to use her previous imprisonment for her faith as evidence to charge her again.

Ms. Li testified in her own defense and argued that she practices Falun Gong to improve her health and hadn't violated any law in upholding her faith. The judge interrupted her.

Because she refuses to renounce her faith that freed her from kidney stones and stomach problems, Ms. Li has already spent a year-and-a-half in a forced labor camp and three years in prison.

Guangdong Woman Convicted for Spreading Information about the Persecution of Her Faith

A Shenzhen City, Guangdong Province, woman was recently sentenced to three years and three months in prison after she appeared in the Nanshan District Court on April 18, 2019.

Ms. Fu Xiufang, 51, was arrested on October 25, 2018, and indicted by the Nanshan District Procuratorate on February 14, 2019, for disseminating information about the persecution of Falun Gong using wifi hotspots.

Sichuan Teacher Sentenced to 4.5 Years in Prison

Mr. Xia Chenghui, an elementary school teacher in Luzhou City, Sichuan Province, was sentenced to four-and-a-half years in prison in August 2019 and is currently incarcerated in Jiazhou Prison.

Mr. Xia and his wife, Ms. Liu Xiaolin, were first targeted in 2015 for filing criminal complaints against former Chinese communist party leader Jiang Zemin for launching the persecuting of Falun Gong. Ms. Liu was arrested in November 2015 and later sentenced to five years in prison. Mr. Xia escaped arrest but was forced to live away from home for more than two years.

On March 6, 2018, hours after Mr. Xia finally returned home, he was arrested, interrogated, and detained. The police released him on bail 15 days later when he became critically ill. He recovered at home by practicing Falun Gong, only to be taken back into custody months later.

Ablikim Abla, a 22-year-old ethnic Uyghur and Chinese national, was arrested by police in Morocco after arriving at Casablanca's Mohammed V International Airport on Sunday, en route to Germany, and had warned relatives in Istanbul that he might be deported to China, where he could face persecution.

Musajan Hesén, Abla's cousin, told RFA's Uyghur Service on Wednesday that he arrived safely in Istanbul following his three-day detention in Morocco.

"He returned to Istanbul a few hours ago—he sent me a text around 4:00 p.m.," he said, adding that he was "not exactly sure about the situation surrounding his return."

An immigration officer who answered the phone at Mohammed V International Airport told RFA that he had no information about Abla, and details about why he was detained there were not immediately available.

According to family members, Abla's parents took him to Turkey from their home in northwest China's Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region (XUAR) in 2016 to enroll in school, but were detained upon their return to the seat of Aksu (in Chinese, Akesu) prefecture's Aykol township, where they live and work as farmers.

While Abla's mother is believed to have been released, his father, Abla Jelil, was sentenced to 10 years in prison for sending his son to Turkey, a country with a substantial Uyghur exile population that is blacklisted by authorities for travel by Uyghurs due to the perceived threat of religious extremism.

A spokesperson with New York-based Human Rights Watch told RFA on Wednesday that the organization is investigating Abla's case, but was also unclear why he might have been detained.

"We would like to reiterate that no one should send Uyghurs back to China these days, given the very high likelihood of persecution," the spokesperson said in an email.

Last month, a Uyghur man facing deportation to China from Qatar said that his decision to flee Pakistan was prompted by claims that nine members of his ethnic group had been forcibly returned home from the South Asian nation, where he ran a company with ties to a Beijing-backed infrastructure plan.

Ablikim Yusup, 53, arrived safely in the U.S. in early August with the help of U.S. Embassy officials after initially trying to reach Europe by way of Bosnia, which refused him entry and had sent him to Qatar, where authorities said they would deport him to Beijing, according to media reports.

Yusup had appealed for days for help on social media posts from Qatar's Doha International Airport, saying that he feared for his safety if sent back to China.

Also last month, sources told RFA that a woman and her two toddler daughters were deported to China from Turkey via Tajikistan in June and now face persecution from authorities in the XUAR.

Zinnetgul Tursun and her daughters, Hilal Shehinur and Banu Abdullah, were first sent from Istanbul, Turkey to Tajikistan's capital Dushanbe, and then taken by Chinese police officers on a June 31 flight from Dushanbe to the XUAR capital Urumqi, according to her sister, who lives in exile in Saudi Arabia.

Mass incarcerations

Authorities are believed to have held more than 1.5 million Uyghurs and other Muslim minorities accused of harboring “strong religious views” and “politically incorrect” ideas in a vast network of internment camps in the XUAR since April 2017.

While Beijing initially denied the existence of the camps, China this year changed tack and began describing the facilities as “boarding schools” that provide vocational training for Uyghurs, discourage radicalization, and help protect the country from terrorism.

Reporting by RFA’s Uyghur Service and other media organizations, however, has shown that those in the camps are detained against their will and subjected to political indoctrination, routinely face rough treatment at the hands of their overseers, and endure poor diets and unhygienic conditions in the often overcrowded facilities.

Mass incarcerations in the XUAR, as well as other policies seen to violate the rights of Uyghurs and other Muslims, have led to increasing calls by the international community to hold Beijing accountable for its actions in the region.

On Tuesday, at an event on the side lines of the United Nations General Assembly in New York, U.S. Deputy Secretary of State John J. Sullivan said that the U.N. had failed to hold China to account over its policies in the XUAR and should demand unfettered access to the region to investigate reports of the mass incarceration and other rights abuses against ethnic Uyghurs.

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Tormented Jehovah's Witnesses missionaries leave China

Believers from South Korea are packing their things to go home to escape CCP's persecution and harassment they face every day because of their faith.

Bitter Winter (13.09.2019) - <https://bit.ly/2kzN6gC> - "I've never encountered such persecution as in China anywhere else I have been to. There are surveillance cameras everywhere. There is no personal freedom," a Jehovah's Witnesses elder from South Korea summarized to *Bitter Winter* his ten-year-plus experience living in China.

He came to the eastern [province](#) of Shandong over a decade ago to devote himself to missionary work. This year, he decided to return to his home country. He said that like other Jehovah's Witnesses from abroad, he would try to persevere until the end of the year. Now, he is getting ready to sell his apartment before the move.

In mid-August, he asked a fellow local believer to keep some of his religious books and CDs, because he was afraid that they could be used to deport him should the police find them at his home. He was reluctant to part with the books; after all, he has used them for preaching in Shandong for the past decade.

The main reason for his decision is the intensifying suppression against religious movements and groups from abroad. After the [United Front Work Department](#) and the [Ministry of Public Security](#) jointly issued last year the *Work Plan of the Special Operation to Investigate and Deal with Overseas Christian Infiltration According to Law*, authorities throughout China have been cracking down on [Jehovah's Witnesses](#) and other religious groups, like [South Korean Christian churches](#).

Because of the crackdowns, [more and more Jehovah's Witnesses from abroad have been arrested and deported](#). In May, a Jehovah's Witnesses elder was deported back to his home country from Shandong's Qingdao city after the police tracked him down during a religion-related investigation. As a rule, according to Jehovah's Witnesses in China, the deported missionaries are prohibited from returning to China for five years, but church elders are permanently barred from entering the country again.

"To avoid being tracked down and arrested by the [CCP](#), we have installed several 'layers' to enter our meeting venue. First, there is a security door; then, large foam boards are

attached to it, and also a folding partition conceals the door,” the elder from South Korea explained some security measures that they had to implement. “During our gatherings, we keep the windows tightly closed and put up several layers of curtains. Besides, we can’t gather at the same place for a long time and must change the meeting venue whenever necessary. We often have to gather on short notice because we don’t know where the gathering is being held. Since January, our meeting venue has been changed more than a dozen times.”

As part of their customs, female Jehovah’s Witnesses usually wear long skirts to express their devotion to God. In the tense and hostile environment in China, women started wearing pants during gatherings. That way, if the police come to arrest them, they don’t need to change their clothes and can flee immediately – one of the many tricks they were forced to learn [to survive being Jehovah’s Witnesses in China](#).

A Jehovah’s Witness from South Korea who also lives in Shandong told Bitter Winter that seeing foreign missionaries around her being deported, one after another, she and her husband have become more cautious in their daily lives.

“When we need to buy a SIM card or rent an apartment, we ask local believers to do it for us. When property management staff come knocking on our door, we don’t dare to open it. We wanted to take the subway when it had just opened, but after hearing that IDs are checked, we were discouraged,” she said. “Every day, when we open our eyes and see that everything is fine, we thank God.”

“One time, I went to the bus station to pick up a friend, and a person in uniform questioned and photographed me. I was terrified at the time, thinking he was a police officer. I later learned that he was a security guard. It was frightening, but I wasn’t in any danger,” she said with lingering fear while recounting her experience.

Jehovah’s Witnesses in other parts of China also face the same dangers. A member from Cangzhou city in the northern province of Hebei, a native Chinese, recounted to Bitter Winter that last May, five South Korean preachers from one venue were arrested and deported, others were harassed by the authorities. The believer also revealed that to evade the government’s surveillance, believers started using public telephones to contact each other. On their mobile phones, they don’t indicate real names on contact lists, and they never answer calls from unknown numbers.

“We keep our gatherings concealed now. It’s like guerrilla warfare – we’re constantly on the move from place to place. We have no choice. The CCP’s persecution forces us to do this. We have to be careful,” the believer from Cangzhou said. “The government is afraid of us having contact with foreigners, fearing that this will threaten the Communist Party’s regime. We never get involved in politics. All we do when we’re together is worship God.”

Although not on the list of the [xie jiao](#), the activities of Jehovah’s Witnesses in China are regarded as illegal. In mid-April, 17 Jehovah’s Witnesses in [Xinjiang’s](#) Korla city were indicted for “using an evil religion organization” to “incite the obstruction of law enforcement” and one for “obstructing law enforcement by organizing and using an evil religious organization.” It is the first time that [Article 300](#) of the Criminal Code, usually reserved for organizations listed as xie jiao, [was applied against Jehovah’s Witnesses](#).

UCA News (28.08.2019) - <https://bit.ly/2PmdAAR> - The Catholic Church in China has ordained another bishop after the Vatican's recommendation was ratified by Beijing.

Father Stephen Xu Hongwei, 44, was ordained as coadjutor bishop of Hanzhong in the northern state of Shaanxi on Aug. 28, just two days after the ordination of Bishop Joseph Yao Shun of Jining in Inner Mongolia, the first since the 2018 China-Vatican provisional agreement on bishops' appointments.

Bishop Xu was approved as a candidate for bishop by the Vatican on April 11 but, just like Bishop Yao before him, had to wait several months for it to be rubberstamped by the government.

The head of the Bishops' Conference of the Catholic Church in China (BCCCC), Bishop Joseph Ma Yinglin of Kunming, held the ordination and concelebrated with Bishop Aloysius Yu Runshen of Hanzhong, Bishop John Baptist Yang Xiaoting of Yan'an (Yulin), Bishop Anthony Dang Mingyan of Xi'an, Bishop Martin Wu Qinjing of Zhouzhi, Bishop Joseph Han Yingjin of Sanyuan, Coadjutor Bishop John Baptist Wang Xiaoxun of Ankang and Bishop Tong Changping of Weinan.

About 500 people attended the Mass at St. Michael Cathedral in the city of Hanzhong. A local priest, who asked not to be named, told ucanews.com that this ceremony was attended by stronger security than Bishop Yao's.

"All the participants had to register and some of them were not allowed to take in cameras or video recording devices," he said.

A parishioner told ucanews.com that a diocesan priest who is still not recognized by the government was not allowed to attend the ceremony and another one was absent "on travel."

Bishop Xu duly received an approval statement from the BCCCC, declaring that "after verification and a valid election, we give our official approval now. This candidate was approved by the pope."

However, following the signing of the China-Vatican deal, the sentence "This candidate was approved by the pope" is a new addition, while another sentence was omitted compared with the old version.

An ordination ceremony should be undertaken within three months of the appointment being approved by the BCCCC, according to church custom, and "once he is ordained, he becomes the formal successor of the apostles and a member of the bishops' conference." Bishop Xu was born on Jan. 16, 1975, in Shaanxi. He studied in a Xi'an seminary in 1996 and was ordained as a priest in Hanzhong in 2002. He graduated with a master's degree on pastoral theology in Rome in 2008 and served in the Diocese of Vancouver in Canada until 2010.

Hanzhong Diocese has 27 priests, eight nuns and one seminarian serving nearly 20,000 Catholics in 21 churches.

Qatar withdraws support for China over its treatment of Muslims

Bloomberg (21.08.2019) - <https://bloom.bg/2HjdweI> - Qatar withdrew from a letter signed by dozens of countries expressing support for China's human-rights record despite growing international condemnation over its detention of as many as two million ethnic Muslim Uighurs.

Qatar informed United Nations Human Rights Council President Coly Seck of its decision to withdraw from the July 12 letter, which was signed by mostly majority-Muslim nations, according to a copy of the correspondence seen by Bloomberg. Several calls and e-mails to Qatar's government communications office and the UN mission weren't returned.

"Taking into account our focus on compromise and mediation, we believe that co-authorizing the aforementioned letter would compromise our foreign policy key priorities," Ambassador Ali Al-Mansouri, Qatar's permanent representative to the UN in Geneva, wrote to Seck on July 18. "In this regard, we wish to maintain a neutral stance and we offer our mediation and facilitation services." His signature also appeared on the July 12 letter supporting China.

It wasn't clear what prompted the change of heart. Qatar, the world's largest exporter of liquefied natural gas, would be loathe to damage ties with China, which was the country's third-largest trading partner in 2018 with some \$13 billion in total commerce, according to data compiled by Bloomberg.

Qatar's Emir Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani visited Beijing in January, when President Xi Jinping addressed him as an "old friend and a good friend," according to reports.

But more than two years into a diplomatic and economic embargo by a four-nation, Saudi-led coalition, Doha has also stressed its desire to build ties with the West, including European nations and the U.S.

Thirty-seven countries, including Saudi Arabia and Pakistan, signed the letter defending Xi's government and dismissing its ongoing crackdown on Uighurs in the far western region of Xinjiang.

It was sent after 22 mostly Western nations mounted the first collective global criticism of China's policy toward Uighurs. They urged Beijing to end the mass detentions and expressed concern over "widespread surveillance and restrictions" on Uighurs in a July 8 statement to another UN body, the High Commissioner for Human Rights.

The re-education camps in Xinjiang, a region home to some 10 million Uighurs, have prompted calls for sanctions against Beijing from U.S. lawmakers, human rights advocates and religious groups. The State Department says as many as two million Uighurs are being held in the camps, a number China contests even though it hasn't disclosed an official figure.

Xi's government has defended the crackdown as necessary to combat terrorism and has used Xinjiang as a laboratory for its sophisticated mass surveillance system, from facial recognition technology to security checkpoints at markets.

Qatar has been caught in the crosshairs of the Uighur crackdown before.

Earlier this year, activists worked to stop the deportation of Uighur advocate Ablikim Yusuf from Qatar back to China, allowing him to leave for the U.S. instead. 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Pro-CCP hackers in action: FOREF site attacked

Forum for Religious Freedom Europe's most successful videos ever denounced the persecution against The Church of Almighty God's refugees in South Korea. A dark hand (or rather a red hand) made them inaccessible.

Bitter Winter (04.08.2019) - <https://bit.ly/2OEgVuI> - On July 31, 2019, Bitter Winter published an article by Jia Zhigang. Jia was a well-known actor in China. After he converted to The Church of Almighty God, he had to flee China because of persecution and currently lives in South Korea. Our article led many readers to search Google for Jia Zhigang. They discovered that in 2018, he had already been interviewed by Austrian journalist Peter Zoehrer, and the video was posted on the Web site of FOREF, the Forum for Religious Freedom Europe, a NGO whose president is the world-famous human rightsactivist, Dr Aaron Rhodes.

Actually, for a somewhat exceptional coincidence - believers would rather say thanks to the providence of God - Zoehrer happened to be in Seoul for a conference in the same days when the 2018 false "spontaneous demonstrations" against The Church of Almighty God refugees were organized by the CCP and its Korean fellow traveler, Ms. O Myung-ok. The demonstrations were repeated on July 22-24, 2019 and in both cases ended in disgrace.

Zoehrer was able to document the 2018 false demonstrations, and to produce 14 videos where The Church of Almighty God refugees told their stories of detention and torture in China, and harassment in Korea. These videos were the most successful media production of FOREF ever. They have been downloaded or watched by more than 56,000 viewers.

In the last few days, hackers attacked FOREF's YouTube channel and were able to make eight videos inaccessible, including the one about the false demonstrations of 2018 and seven interviews with members of The Church of Almighty God living in South Korea. One of them was actor Jia Zhigang.

The videos have now been made accessible again. The attack, however, confirms how much the CCP and its minions are afraid of truth. In Communist countries, as Soviet dissident Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn (1918-2008) used to say, "the lie has become not just a moral category, but a pillar of the State."

The original Axis of Shame, a label Bitter Winter is proud both to have created and to see increasingly used by others, included 37 countries. The CCP has now announced that 13 more have signed, mentioning Iran, Iraq, Sri Lanka, Djibouti, and Palestine. Indeed, that Iran, another egregious violator of religious liberty, was missing among the original 37, was somewhat surprising.

Most countries sign, but realize that what they are doing is not honorable. They are ashamed to be part of the Axis of Shame. They ask the CCP not to make their names public.

Others, among the original signatories, support the CCP with statements and interviews. Some belong to the category of involuntary humor. An "expert" working for Saudi Arabia claimed that, before the enlightened activities of the CCP happily opened their minds, Muslims in Xinjiang were "close-minded." Perhaps nobody informed the Saudis that the CCP uses "de-saudization" as a synonym of "de-radicalization," claiming that the resurgence of Muslim pride in China is due to the evil influence of Saudi Arabia. Or can we expect that CCP experts will be invited to Saudi Arabia to "open the mind" of local Muslims?

More involuntary comic relief was offered by statements from the Venezuelan and Cuban embassies in Beijing. The Cubans said that their government is opposed to any efforts

aimed at "regime changes" in China and elsewhere. One may vaguely suspect that by "elsewhere" they mean Cuba.

Venezuela stated that "China's leadership in human rights is indisputable." This is literally true in Venezuela. Those who would "dispute" that all is well in China, a staunch ally of the Maduro regime-or in Venezuela, for that matter-would go to jail.

What the CCP believes it can achieve by putting together such a shameful circus of human rights violators is unclear. Perhaps, once again, these news are mostly used for domestic consumption in China.

China rebuked at UN over Uighur detention

Over 20 countries urge China to halt detention but fears of potential backlash prevented a formal statement.

Al Jazeera (10.07.2019) - <https://bit.ly/2NNDHzW> - More than 20 countries have called on China to halt its mass detention of ethnic minority Uighurs in the country's Xinjiang region in the first such joint move on the issue at the United Nations' Human Rights Council, according to diplomats and a letter seen by Reuters news agency.

UN experts and activists say at least one million Uighurs and other Muslims are being held in detention centres in the remote western region of the country.

China describes them as training centres, helping to stamp out "extremism" and give people new skills.

The unprecedented letter to the president of the forum, dated July 8, was signed by the ambassadors of 22 countries. Australia, Canada and Japan were among them, along with European countries including the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Switzerland, but not the United States, which quit the forum a year ago.

It fell short of a formal statement being read out at the Council or a resolution submitted for a vote, as sought by activists. This was due to governments' fears of a potential political and economic backlash from China, diplomats said.

"It is a first collective response on Xinjiang," a Western diplomat told Reuters on Wednesday. "The idea of a resolution was never on the cards."

Another envoy said: "It's a formal step because it will be published as an official document of the Council ... it is a signal."

'Large-scale places of detention'

The letter voices concern at reports of unlawful detention in "large-scale places of detention, as well as widespread surveillance and restrictions, particularly targeting Uighurs and other minorities in Xinjiang".

It pointedly cites China's obligations as a member of the 47-member state forum to maintain the highest standards.

"We call on China to uphold its national laws and international obligations and to respect human rights and fundamental freedoms, including freedom of religion or belief in Xinjiang and across China," the letter said.

"We also call on China to refrain from the arbitrary detention and restrictions on freedom of movement of Uighurs, and other Muslim and minority communities in Xinjiang."

The letter urges China to allow international independent experts, including UN High Commissioner for Human Rights Michelle Bachelet, "meaningful access" to Xinjiang.

Bachelet, former Chile president, has pushed China to grant the UN access to investigate reports of disappearances and arbitrary detentions, particularly Muslims of Xinjiang.

Last month, China's ambassador to the UN in Geneva said he hoped Bachelet would take up an invitation to visit. A UN spokesperson said at the time that the trip, including "full access to Xinjiang", was under discussion.

No Western delegation was willing to take the lead and expose itself as a "ringleader" through a joint statement or resolution, diplomats said. China's delegation is "hopping mad" at the move and is preparing its own letter, a diplomat said.

At the start of the three-week session, which ends on Friday, the Xinjiang vice governor responded to the international condemnation of the state-run detention camps by saying that they were vocational centres which had helped "save" people from "extremist" influences.

China had now effectively contained "terrorism" and "religious extremism" in Xinjiang, Vice Governor Erkin Tuniyaz told the Council in an appearance that was sharply criticised by the US.

They include publishing, illegally, the pictures and names of refugees of The Church of Almighty God living in Korea, co-operating with the CCP in false demonstrations against the same refugees, and publishing books in Korean to spread CCP propaganda against Falun Gong.

She was mentioned in the conference Bitter Winter co-organized in Seoul on June 20 as an egregious example of how bigotry and hate speech harm refugees, and society in general, in Korea.

She sent some friends to take pictures at the conference, and has now published a report on her Web site churchheresy.com (the name already tells it all, as it implies that she is "the Church" and all those who disagree with her represent "heresy.")

It is an extraordinary article, where Ms. O shows her true colors. Apart from insulting Bitter Winter for, allegedly, disseminating false information (she does not provide examples), Ms. O implies that the conference was co-organized by Falun Gong and offers a long tirade against this movement. In fact, Falun Gong was not among the co-organizers of the conference, there were no Falun Gong speakers, and certainly the doctrines of Falun Gong she criticizes at length were not discussed. The CCP, however, asks that Falun Gong be routinely attacked when discussing religions hostile to the CCP, and Ms. O routinely complies.

It is also very interesting to read that Ms. O., who repeats her shameful and unchristian attacks against The Church of Almighty God refugees in South Korea, asks that they should be dealt with in cooperation with the Chinese government. We told our readers all

along that Ms. O promotes cooperation with the Chinese government and the CCP, but it is nice to hear it confirmed from her own voice.

There is also the fantastic claim that “extremist” Uyghur Muslims participated in the conference, with the usual CCP claims of alleged Uyghur support for fundamentalism and terrorism. In fact, Ms. Nurgul Sawut of Campaign for Uyghurs spoke at the conference. Campaign for Uyghurs is a secular rather than a religious organization. Had Ms O studied at least some first basic facts about Islam, she would have understood that a woman appearing in public without a veil cannot be part of “fundamentalist” or “extremist” Islam.

All Ms. O has to say about Islam is that “it does not recognize the Holy Spirit,” and “distorts” the theology about the same Holy Spirit. Ms. O, whose credentials as an expert of comparative religion are unclear, ends up by offending Muslims in general and concluding that “it is reasonable to regard Islam as a heresy of Christianity rather than acknowledging it as one of the world’s three major religions.” Hate speech and bigotry, indeed.
